GENERAL INFORMATION

Northern Illinois University is a public supported comprehensive university enrolling nearly 24,000 students. The main campus is located in DeKalb, Illinois, a medium sized midwest town of approximately 30,000 surrounded by a rich agricultural region. DeKalb is 65 miles west of Chicago's Loop on Interstate 88, 45 miles southeast of Rockford, and 60 miles from O'Hare Airport. DeKalb is one mile north of the East-West Tollway (I-88), at the junction of state highways 38 and 23. First-time visitors to NIU exiting from the East-West Tollway are advised to use the Annie Glidden Exit and travel north crossing HWY 38 to enter the campus, as this is the most clearly marked approach to the campus. A map of the campus and the surrounding area will be mailed to participants with confirmation of their registration. All sessions will take place in the Holmes Student Center, a 16-story complex located in the heart of the NIU campus.

CONFERENCE CAPACITY

This conference is limited to 150 participants. After that number has registered, NIU will start a waiting list. Late registrants will not have access to special conference rates on housing and food service.

HOUSING

Participants must make their own reservations; telephone: (815) 753-1444 or write Guest Rooms, Holmes Student Center, Northern Illinois University, DeKalb, Illinois 60115. A block of rooms has been reserved for the nights of March 24, 25, and 26. Rooms will be held for AMSA participants until March 10. Guest rooms are equipped with either twin or queen size beds, color TV, air conditioning, and full bath and shower facilities. Guest room patrons enjoy free parking adjacent to the Holmes Student Center and have access to the entertainment and recreational facilities within the Center. Cost per room per night including taxes is: \$37.74 single occupancy; \$43.29 double occupancy; \$48.84 triple occupancy. If reserving by mail or phone, be sure to ask for the American Men's Studies Association rooms and include your credit card number and expiration date.

TRANSPORTATION TO DeKALB FROM CHICAGO'S O'HARE AIRPORT

Because there is no convenient public transportation between DeKalb and Chicago airports, NIU vehicles will provide transportation at the times listed below for conference participants who reserve seats. In making your plans, allow two hours travel time between DeKalb and O'Hare; the road time is about 90 minutes, but traffic at the airport can be heavy. An NIU vehicle will pick up incoming travelers at the lower street baggage level, door "E" outside of the United Airlines Terminal. NIU vehicles will also transport participants back to O'Hare Airport at the times listed below. The NIU vehicles will leave from the Carroll Avenue (West Side) exit of Holmes Student Center and drop travellers at their respective airline terminals.

Depart O'Hare/United: Friday, March 25 at 12 noon and 4 p.m.
Depart DeKalb/HSC: Sunday, March 26 at 1 p.m.

The cost is \$30 and includes transportation to and from O'Hare. Please provide flight information when you receive and return your registration materials. If you do not have flight information when you register, please call Steven Johnson (815) 753-5200. It is important to reserve your specific NIU transportation times; it is possible that runs will be combined or changed depending on participants' needs.

Several limousine companies provide service between the Chicago airports and DeKalb. Participants may engage this service at their own expense and should make arrangements before arriving in Chicago: (1) Classic Limousine service (800) 831-5166; (2) Custom Limousine (800) 397-7931, (815) 895-6500; (3) DeKalb-O'Hare Limousine Service (815) 758-0631. The cost is \$40-\$50 per person, one-way, depending on time of day and number of people being transported on one trip.

COST

The conference registration fee includes registration materials, two lunches, the banquet, continental breakfasts, and refreshments. General on-site registration is \$170. Conference registration for AMSA members is \$120. General advanced registration is \$160; early registration (before February 28) is \$140. Student registration for the conference is \$60. Saturday only registration is \$85 (students, \$40). Lodging and meals are the responsibility of individual participants. Costs of Holmes Student Center Guest Rooms are noted above. There is a cafeteria in the Holmes Student Center Building. A number of off-campus restaurants are within easy walking distance.

A combined registration fee for AMSA members including materials, refreshments, the banquet, two lunches and scheduled transportation to and from O'Hare is \$150. Registrants will receive a campus map with parking locations with their registration confirmations. Confirmation of lodging reservations will be sent under separate cover directly from Holmes Student Hotel Guest Rooms.

REFUNDS

Requests for refunds must be made in writing to the Conference Manager, Charles Harvey Miley, P.O. Box 181, Genoa, Illinois 60135-0181. Requests must be postmarked prior to March 10, 1994. A full refund, minus a \$35 service charge, will be issued for each request. No refunds will be made for requests postmarked after March 10, 1994.
